Okay. So what I am going to do is I'll read as much of it as I can, I don't know how much I can get in ten minutes and then you can ask me any questions you have.

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Okay. It's based on comments of this document here, you are familiar with this document of course, and it's outlining the Plan for mobility and urbanism of Montréal. So I'll be very brief, as much brief as I can be.

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M. ROBERT HAJALY:

Thank you very much, now, that's it.

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LA PRÉSIDENTE:

Thank you to you. You work a lot, you read, O.K., that's it. First question, what did you think about the idea to put together the mobility and urbanism in the PUM?

M. ROBERT HAJALY:

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Well, obviously they are very closely related, aren't they?

LA PRÉSIDENTE:

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Do you think that it is a very good idea, because it is the first time that the City of Montréal put together in a plan mobility and urbanism?

M. ROBERT HAJALY:

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They have to be related because the development of the City is very crucially determined by mobility. I mean, where people can go tells you where things can be developed, you know, where people can live it.

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Mobility is related to virtually every activity on the Island. It seems to me that it's incredible that it is the first time they are being related, let's just say that. It's obvious that they should be related. Yes, that goes without saying, almost.

LA PRÉSIDENTE:

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On your idea number 6, when you discuss about public library. Is there any area where you think there could be, you could have a priority to have public library?

M. ROBERT HAJALY :

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I wouldn't know specific areas of Montréal. I know that in my area, I live downtown, we have been fighting for 20 years to get a public library and we are finally getting it, but I mean, I don't have that kind of specific knowledge.

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I was just very surprised; I'll say this, that they think that 70 % of people having access to public library by 2050 is a wonderful target. I don't think that's a wonderful target. That means 30 % don't have access to a public library. That's why ideally, it should be 100 %, they should be aiming at a 100 %, and I really mean that.

LA PRÉSIDENTE:

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Do you think that it is possible, just objectively; do you think that it is possible?

M. ROBERT HAJALY:

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Well, I don't know about the city's finances, I mean if the finances permit it, it's possible, sure. I mean, what is their involvement in creating a library? Putting up a building? Buying books? It is a question of money and also, of course, of skilled personal. I can't answer more than that; I am not a person responsible for the library system of Montréal.

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And in principal, if you have the money, you can get the resources and I don't see why it's not possible.

LA PRÉSIDENTE:

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Is there anything that you read in the document that you just showed us that surprises you?

M. ROBERT HAJALY:

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I think that's the thing that surprises me the most, actually. Just this...

LA PRÉSIDENTE:

... The question about the public library...?

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M. ROBERT HAJALY :

... This is about, they think 70 % is an ideal target, meaning leaving out 30 %, I was shocked by that actually, a little bit. That was the most surprising thing. The rest is almost predictable. I mean, it reflects, let's be honest, it's reflects the priorities of the present administration, I am actually a member of Project Montréal, I know all about them, so I know how they think.

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The document reflects their priorities, they are their vision of Montréal and that's good, in general. But, no, the one thing that shocked me was them thinking that 70 % of people having access to a library is a good target for 2050, that's 26 years from now, they think that's all they can achieve in 26 years? No, that's shocking.
